Perspectives on Precepting

Today's topic:

Providing feedback

Feedback. It's vital to student learning but can be tough for clinical educators to provide. Sometimes, the obstacle is time - the clinical day is so busy that it can be tough to fit in providing feedback to a student. Sometimes, we hesitate to provide critical feedback to students; it makes us uncomfortable. Other times, we think "I'll tell them later" but then we forget.

Needless to say, providing students with feedback is how they learn!

Heck, we should be asking the students for feedback about our precepting too - it's how we learn!

Consider jotting down your observations as you work with a student. This way, you won't forget them. Another idea: Schedule a regular 10-minute meeting with the student to discuss how they're doing and ask what you can do to help further their learning.

Watching a student gain skills and confidence is really fun! Providing feedback is how we help them 'get there'.

The Council of Academic Programs in **Communication Sciences and** Disorders (CAPCSD) has eLearning courses about topics in Precepting and Supervision – and they're FREE for you. There is an entire course dedicated to feedback - its importance in clinical education as well as tools that you can use to help you provide feedback. After graduating I started working for Cherry Creek School District in Denver, Colorado. Every day is different and I love the variety and flexibility. One day we could be screening 600 students (one class of 30 kids every 15 minutes makes for a long day). The next day I could be doing IEPs, troubleshooting FM equipment, or explaining a student's hearing loss for the 10th time to a teacher. This job has taught me a lot about myself though. It has taught me how to let things go and how to be goofy with kids. This job has also taught me how to think outside the box and be creative in coming up with solutions. FM systems/screening equipment breaks often and we can't always call someone or pay to have it fixed.
