# **EVALUATION CRITERIA:**

There will be 3 quizzes given over the course of the semester. There will be  $n_0$ make-up quizzes. If you miss a quiz because of an excused absence, a written critique of a selected article may be substituted for the quiz score. Maximum points available from the quizzes is 75.

There will be two, in-class, midterm examinations. These tests will be a combination of multiple choice, true/false, and short essay questions. Each midterm has a maximum point value of 100.
