This course will explore the sociology of nonviolence by looking at Gandhi, king, and contemporary efforts which take up their unfinished agenda of "total revolution." Along the way we will consider how nonviolence is related to violence, to power, to democracy, to revolution. Examples will be drawn from struggles throughout the world. Local activists will meet with the class.
