<u>Course Description</u>: Sociology is the scientific study of society, social relationships, and social institutions. This course will examine how sociologists conceptualize and study sex, love, and intimate relationships in society. It will investigate the constructions of sex, love, and intimate relationships over time, and how broad social phenomena connect to, and impact, changes in intimate life. It will explore the meanings and variations of sex, love, and relationships across time and space.

#### **Required Texts:**

There will be no required texts in this class. All readings will be available online through the learning portal (D2L). All readings listed on the schedule for a specific week should be completed by Tuesday of that week.

#### **Grading:**

Grading for the class will be determined by the following breakdown:

Reading Response Questions (15%): Every Tuesday (except during exam weeks and fall break), you should turn in a response to the reading assignment for that week. These responses only need to be about a paragraph long. You should write a few sentences of your thoughts on the reading, and then write a discussion question for the class (it is my hope that we can address these during the Thursday class period each week). Responses should be typed and need to be submitted electronically by the beginning of class each Tuesday. At 12:30, the portal will close and no further submissions will be accepted. A total of 10 responses will be graded for each student, so you can miss two weeks of responses without penalty to your final grade. For weeks where there are multiple readings, you may choose to focus on only one reading for your response.

**In-Class Work (10% of total grade):** From time to time we will do in-class work and activities. The worksheets that accompany the films fall under this category, as well as group work and the accompanying worksheets. There is no make-up work for this category.

**Exams (75% of total grade)**: There will be three exams in this class. These exams are not cumulative and will cover the material in one of the three sections that break down the class. Testable material includes lecture, readings, and movies falling under the appropriate section. The format of exams will be a combination of short answer questions and essay questions. Exams are always on Thursdays. Please refer to the class calendar for specific exam dates.

Exam Make-Up Policy- If you have to miss an exam, I will allow make-ups *only with official documentation*. Official documentation examples include doctor's notes, documentation from the athletic department (for athletes), etc. A note from your parents does not count as official documentation. You must notify me either prior to the missed exam, if you know you will be absent, or within 48 hours after the exam. *If you do not notify me within 48 hours after the exam, you waive your opportunity to take a make-up exam*. Make-ups will consist of an alternate exam and date and time must be arranged with the instructor.
