The old theatrical organization has become unjustifiable, is no longer answerable to anyone; the old phantoms called the author, the reader, the director, the stage manager, the machinist, the actor, the characters, the spectator, etc., have no single, unique, fixed place (state, wings, house, etc.) assigned to themselves by themselves, except in the representation they make of it to themselves, of which an account must be given. (Derrida *Dissemination* 296).
