 - i. Space Allocation Committee votes are moved to next meeting
 - ii. Started food assistance program and Buff Pantry (2020)
 - iii. 1B73 is their current space alongside the Book Store
 - iv. Serve 150 students per week
 - v. Planning to add more staff
 - vi. Basic Needs Center
 - 1. Provides additional resources for students in a tech-based environment
 - 2. Housing affordability, food assistance
 - 3. Purpose is to be a more centralized space
 - vii. Document shows a two-year plan
 - viii. Timeline
 - 1. Now going through hiring and budget (working with CUSG)
 - 2. Tight on funding
 - 3. CSU, UC Berkeley and CU Denver now have basic needs offices

- 4. Starting to hire new staff by July, then launch center in August
 - a. 3 Professional Staff, 10 Student Staff
 - b. VRC 4 Professional, 12 Students
- 5. Proximity to UMC
- ix. Space is about 1200 square feet
- x. Basic Needs Office and VRC should be centralized
- xi. 1034 square feet Requested rooms are in fourth floor
- xii. Other possible spaces
 - 1. Center for Community not very convenient because it is on the fourth floor and has a much smaller space
- xiii. Option for potential revenue
- xiv. They need a private space for conversations with professional and student staff
- xv. They want it to be comfortable
- xvi. Two spaces will be for VRC staff
