Founded in 1974 through the diligence of a group of faculty, students, and staff, the Women Studies Program at CU-Boulder is the oldest in the state of Colorado, and one of the oldest in the nation. First led by Dr. Carol Pearson, Women Studies was an independently-structured major built on over 20 courses in numerous disciplines across campus. The

Beyond Partition: Gender, Violence, and Representation in Postcolonial India Deepti Misri

Beyond Partition explores the cultural representation of a history of politicized animosity associated with the differing ideas of "India" held by communities and in regions on one hand, and by the political-military Indian state on the other. Misri begins with the moment of India's Partition in 1947, and moves on to examine other forms of gendered violence in the postcolonial life of the nation, including custodial rape, public stripping, deturbanning, and enforced disappearances. Assembling literary, historiographic, performative, and visual representations of gendered violence against women and men, *Beyond Partition* interrogates the gendered scripts underwriting the violence precipitated by contested visions of "India" in the postcolonial period.

Love, Money, and HIV: Becoming a Modern African Woman in the Age of AIDS

Sanyu A. Mojola

How do modern women in developing countries experience sexuality and love? Drawing on a rich array of interview, ethnographic, and survey data from her native country of Kenya, Sanyu Mojola examines how young African women, who suffer disproportionate rates of HIV infection compared to young African men, navigate their relationships, schooling, employment, and finances in the context of economic inequality and a devastating HIV epidemic. Writing from a unique outsider-insider perspective, Mojola argues that the entanglement of love, money, and the transformation of girls into "consuming women" lies

at the heart of women's coming-of-age and health crises. At once engaging and compassionate, this text is an incisive analysis of gender, sexuality, and health in Africa.

We are pleased to announce that **Robert Buffington** has officially been promoted to full professor by the chancellor. His latest manuscript, *A Sentimental Education for the Working Man: Mexico City 1900-1910*, which analyzes the impact of modernity on working-class notions of manhood in early twentieth-century Mexico City, was released by Duke University Press in May 2015. The 10th edition of the two-volume *Keen's Latin American Civilization*, which Dr. Buffington has co-edited with Lila Caimari, will be published in July by Westview Press.





in the global call center industry in the Philippines, his article examines new patterns of workplace inequality that emerge as transgender people are incorporated into the global labor market. Dr. David's forthcoming article "The Sexual Fields of Empire: On the Ethnosexual Frontiers of Global Outsourcing," will appear in the fall in the special issue of *Radical History Review* titled, "Sexing Empire: Bodies, Gender, and Desire in Colonial and Postcolonial Relations."

Lorraine Bayard de Volo has recently published an article in the summer 2015 issue of *Signs: Journal of Women in Culture and Society* with Lynn K. Hall, a former U.S. Air Force Academy cadet. "I Wish All the Ladies Were Holes in the Road': The US Air Force Academy and the Gendered Continuum of Violence" analyzes the prevalence of rape and sexual violence in this institution by drawing on interviews, participant observation, military documents and other reports.

The paperback edition of Celeste Montoya's book *From Global to Grassroots: The European Union, Transnational Advocacy, and Combating Violence against Women* (New York: Oxford University Press) came out this spring. She also authored a chapter on "Institutions" published in the *Oxford Handbook of Feminist Theory* (New York: Oxford University Press) edited by Lisa Disch and Mary Hawkesworth. Dr. Montoya presented on her Occupy research "From Identity Politics to Transversal Politics; The Occupy Movement and Intersectionality" at the Western Political Science Association Conference in Las Vegas in April, where she also participated on a roundtable "Gendered Violence: Integrating Theory and Empirics."

The work of Alison Jaggar was celebrated by her current and former students and colleagues at this past August's 38th annual Morris Colloquium "In the Unjust Meantime: A conference in honor of Alison Jaggar." Jaggar presented a keynote speech titled "Reasoning about Justice in the Unjust Meantime: Ideal and Non-Ideal Theory in Political Philosophy," and the conference featured two additional keynote speeches by Susan Brison of Dartmouth College and Elizabeth Spelman of Smith College. This two-day conference was organized by the members of the Philosophy Department at CU-Boulder and supported by the generous contributions of the Bertram Morris Fund, the Graduate Council on the Arts and Humanities, the President's Fund for the Humanities, and the Women and Gender Studies Program.

New Global Gender and Sexuality Studies Certificate

Career specialization in international gender and sexuality has grown in both the private and public sectors, in fields including international development, finance, public health, public policy, and education. We are very pleased to

introduce a new academic offering, designed to help undergraduate students set themselves apart in this competitive job market. The Undergraduate Certificate in Global Gender and Sexuality Studies builds on the research strengths of our core and affiliate faculty, and is available to all CU-Boulder undergraduates enrolled in any program on campus, such as international affairs, political science, sociology, ethnic studies, anthropology, geography, and communication.

Globalization has had a marked impact on our dayto-day lives, not only in the availability of cheaper manufactured goods due to international trade, or



the outsourcing of jobs overseas, but also in the ways in which people around the world express and experience themselves as gendered and sexed beings. The certificate in Global Gender and Sexuality Studies is intended to help students examine these changes through interdisciplinary courses such as Gender Politics and Global Activism; Gender, Genocide & Mass Trauma; and Gender, Race and Class in a Global Context; as well as study abroad offerings including this summer's global seminar in Cuba, Gender, Race & Revolution.

GENDER JUSTICE LEAGUE

The Gender Justice League is our student practicum made up of majors and minors in women and gender studies who are chosen for both their good academic standing and their activist spirit. Led this year by Dr. Deepti Misri in the fall semester and Dr. Celeste Montoya in the spring, the students successfully hosted several popular

events including Denim Days, an annual week of activism aimed at combating gender-based violence and victim blaming.

GJL-Spring15Their first Conversation at the Cottage, "Beyoncé Breakdown," began in response to Beyoncé performing in front of the word "Feminist" at the Video Music Awards. The event attracted a very large audience of students, and featured the viewing of four Beyoncé videos spanning her career. The panelists, Hillary Potter and Bianca Williams of ethnic studies, Tamara Williams Van Horn of sociology, and WGST alumna and MESA staff member Sophia **Surage**, each spoke in regards to the lyrics and images portrayed in Beyonce's videos, and the overall mainstreaming of feminism in popular culture. Their second Conversation, "The NFL and Domestic Violence" supported a discussion of the media's representations of domestic violence and its victims, and the evolution of hazing culture in college sports. Panelists included Joanne Belknap of sociology, Anne Tapp, the executive director of Safehouse Progressive Alliance for Nonviolence; and Chris Bader, CU's director of Counseling and Sports Psychology.

In the spring semester, the GJL hosted "Calling Out Injustice, Calling Into Community" led by student Hibaq Loyan, student Alex Elisha, GSA president Caitlin Rowe, and GLBTQ Resource Center Director Scarlet Bowen. Panelists shared their experiences and discussed ways to address microaggressions in activist spaces while positively calling people into community. Their final Conversation, "Healthy Masculinity," focused on what performances of healthy masculinity might look like and its importance in combating sexual violence.

Panelists Sam Bullington, instructor in women and gender studies, Jack Workman, a women and gender studies undergraduate student, Camilo Casas, program coordinator for MESA's (Moving to End Sexual Assault) Men Standing Up group, and George Williams, a graduate student in sociology, helped lead the discussion.
